I think it would be great to highlight the NYS Vital Records Index as this is not online and Tillinghast researchers from out of state might appreciate the information. What can I do to help with this? I've got a little bit of info that was written up by the Buffalo library to describe it:

"NYS Vital Records Index

1935

The NYS Vital Records Index encompasses births, marriages and deaths that occurred in New York State as early as 1880 and as recent as 1954 for marriages and deaths and 1929 for births. The index provides the name, date and place of birth, marriage or death recorded. It does not contain the actual birth, marriage or death certificates. Those requiring actual copies of these certificates need to apply to the original issuing and/or recording agencies, such as the town, city or state. New York State requires that the index be used in the library. Users must provide valid identification, and no reproduction (printing or photocopying) of the information is permitted."

The part about no printing or photocopying, I think they mean actually printing or photocopying **from the fiche reader** because they let me write down the information I was looking up (I made it clear it was my family name I was researching, not just transcribing records of everyone).

Also, I research often at the Buffalo library and would be happy to look up a Tillinghast marriage or death record on the NY fiche for someone, if you want to put that in the newsletter. You can list my email address.

Is the Tillinghast Society concerning any of the Tillinghast Family (A. Y. & Dorothy Tillinghast) She taught me in First Grade at Mooringsport, LA. 1942-43 School Year. I have always considered her one of my favorite teachers, she seemed so concerned with each of us in the class and took up a lot of time with each of us. I can remember her looking for four-leaf clover on the corner northwest bank of the school yard during lunch. I remember A.Y. working for Gulf Oil and being transferred. Lot of fond memories of them.

Some colonists moved west to Ohio

I have this interesting story from Timothy Tillinghast whom I discovered on Facebook. He has been a long time Tillinghast Society member. I asked about his family's move to near Berlin Heights, Ohio. He replied:

What brought us to this area was the Western Reserve Land Grant, and this section is called the Firelands given to the people who sustained losses from the revolutionary war by the British who burned, salted the land, or killed the people of the colonies. The area has a very interesting history in both the surveying of the western reserve and the hundreds of personal stories told by the first settlers and documented in a large number of journals called the "Pioneer" supported by an early historical society of sorts.

My bride's name is Mary Ann Knittel Tillinghast. A farm I purchased a few years ago was actually owned early on by a Knittel as we found out later. So in essence we are both on our historical ancestor's land. Also on our farm was a brick one room school house. As all school houses it had over the door in the peak a stone plague with the school district number and date built. This stone said District No# 7 1878. The stone was teetering on the edge ready to fall out when a friend informed us of the impending descent of the stone. I with the help of some friends carefully lowered the stone and to our surprise on the back was an inscription and a name of some one past time head stone. My wife looked down and was shocked to see it was the name of her great x4 grand father Levi Cole a prominent founder of the city of Norwalk Ohio 9 miles from us."

Relationship Terms

Sometimes when working on your family history, it's handy to know how to describe your family relationships more accurately. The definitions below should help you out.

Cousin (a.k.a "first cousin")

Your first cousins are the people in your family who have two of the same grandparents as you. In other words, they are the children of your aunts and uncles.

Second Cousin

Your second cousins are the people in your family who have the same great-grandparents as you., but not the same grandparents.

Third, Fourth, and Fifth Cousins

Your third cousins have the same great-great-grandparents, fourth cousins have the same great-great-great-grandparents, and so on.

Removed

When the word "removed" is used to describe a relationship, it indicates that the two people are from different generations. You and your first cousins are in the same generation (two generations younger than your grandparents), so the word "removed" is *not* used to describe your relationship.

The words "once removed" mean that there is a difference of one generation. For example, your mother's first cousin is your first cousin, once removed. This is because your mother's first cousin is one generation younger than your grandparents and you are two generations younger than your grandparents. This one-generation difference equals "once removed."

Twice removed means that there is a two-generation difference. You are two generations younger than a first cousin of your grandmother, so you and your grandmother's first cousin are first cousins, twice removed.

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The Athenaeum would be a good side trip in Providence

Dr. Ed Tillinghast's son, Joel, forwarded an article from the Providence Journal, March 2, 2009, page 1, that might lead us to a special visit at the reunion to The Providence Athenaeum. (www.providenceathenaeum.org)

Except in the imagination, you cannot hear the voice of Edgar Allan Poe and the untold thousands of others who have ventured inside the Providence Athenaeum since its temple-like building opened in 1838 on the East Side of the city.

But here in a place that still holds secrets, traces of these people linger.

Among the oldest is the library's original register, which dates from 1753, when the athenaeum began in a different location as the Providence Library Company. Like other irreplaceable volumes, the register lives in a locked, climate-controlled environment. Today, collections librarian Kate Wodehouse has brought it out into the light.

She rests the volume on a special foam holder, which is more forgiving than metal or wood. The handwritten first paragraph of the first page speaks to the founders' intent:

Whereas a collection or library of useful and edifying books will most certainly tend to the benefit and instruction of the inhabitants of this town and county of Providence and the rising generations thereto belonging...

Wodehouse turns the pages reverentially, to names of founders, including Browns, Tillinghasts and Stephen Hopkins, signatory to the Declaration of Independence. Farther in is a list of the library's first acquisitions: some 345 volumes purchased in England and shipped to America by cargo ship 256 years ago.

"There's a lot of history, geography, travel, exploration, biographies, the classics," Wodehouse says. "There's also an area that's wonderful which dealt with husbandry, agriculture. So some of these books were technical books that they wanted so they could learn the newest and best way to, say, ferry a horse."

The article goes on to say..... it is a peculiar place, the athenaeum, in the sense that ancient books inhabit the same space with bestselling contemporary volumes, DVDs of blockbuster movies and wireless Internet service. And while Greek Revival architecture and an East Side address don't scream an open invitation, the truth is, anyone is welcome inside. Only members may borrow, but the public may share in everything the library offers, at no charge.

Duncan Cornell from NY finds fame of A. W. Tillinghast continues

In an article in the New York Post from Sunday, August 22, 2010, Duncan Cornell found golf course designer A. W. Tillinghast once again held in esteem. As the author, Brett Cyrgalis explores the late, great golf courses of Queens, he refers to a statement by Phil Young, who wrote articles and books about A.W. Young said, "Ask anyone to name the first Tillinghast course to host two major championships, and I'll bet no one gets it. They might guess Balthusrol or Winged Foot, or if they're young, Bethpage Black. It was Fresh Meadow." (By the way, they say Young is with the Tillinghast Society. He is with the Tillinghast Association.)
